Introduction: AQCPE wants to ignite a national conversation on quality

- Quebec is an important laboratory in the country for ECE development and AQCPE wishes to share its experience;
- 20 years of trial and error have demonstrated there is a considerable risk that rapid development can unfold at the expense of quality;
- It's very difficult to fix quality "after the fact", once its levels have become uneven or poor;
- Children across Canada and their families could benefit from stakeholders sharing experience and working towards better quality across the board;
- There is no reason why work-family balance should be achieved at the expense of quality.

A brief history of Quebec's network of ECE services

Development 1997-2003

Supply cannot meet demand

Human and financial resources are growing, but still insufficient.

Growth in CPEs is prioritized.

More emphasis put on workfamily balance than on quality.

Growth 2003-2010

Popularity of CPEs is growing fast and interest outpaces demand.

Human and financial resources are growing slower than demand.

New strategy to increase supply: government now prioritizes for-profit, nonsubsidized spaces.

Work-family balance is made easier, but quality remains low and varies significantly from one service to another.

Maturity 2011-2016

Supply is beginning to meet demand.

End of universality : Fee hikes and differentiated fees according to family income. Severe cuts to subsidized services.

Expansion of for-profit services clearly prioritized.

Work-family balance is within reach.

Quality is scaling back across the board due to for-profit services.

Consolidation 2016-2020

Supply may surpass demand in some regions. Some families choose commercial over CPE because of incentives.

Additional cuts.

Work-family balance is achieved but at the expense of quality, which should be the main focus.

Recognition that early childhood is part of the education pathway, but uneven quality.




Distribution of spaces in Quebec's various ECE services

Distribution as of September 30th, 2017 TOTAL: 296 637 places







Distribution as of September 30, 2017 TOTAL : 100 911 places






Quebec surveys on quality of ECE services, 2003 & 2014

AQCPE's repositioning : from activist to leader and agent of positive change

2018

Actions to directly and indirectly stimulate public awareness and support of the importance of quality in order to influence political candidates in the 2018 Quebec Fall election.

Bill 143. OECD Conference in Paris.

Spring 2017 Summit on ECE. Over 30 organizations representing 2 million citizens signed on to the Declaration.

2015

Mobilisation against cuts in subsidized ECE services and against modulated fees : 200 000 signed petition, 50 000 demonstrators.

Summer/Fall 2017

Follow-up on Declaration. Creation of a steering committee to gather more signatures. Meetings with political parties. Mobilization of parents and influencers.

2016

Commission on early childhood education. 14 cities, 23 experts, 135 groups, 167 briefs, 416 citizens, 5000 parents surveyed.


2014

Mobilisation against modulated fees, petition of 75 000 names and demonstration attracting 75 000 people.




Making some strides

Association québécoise



- The cuts made during this government's term have been partially cancelled and replaced by special budgetary allocations.
- Government cancelled modulation of fees for 3rd child and cut it by half for the 2nd.
- Government officially recognizes that ECE is part of the educational curriculum
- Organizations that have signed our Declaration represent more than 2 million people

What now? How can we influence decision-makers to opt for quality?



Quebec votes in 2018

PLQ	 Have governed Quebec for 15 of the past 20 years In favour of modulation of fees according to family income Want to maintain a variety of models (public & private) In favour of 4-year old free kindergarten for underpriviledged
Q	 Adopted the family policy in 1997 (low fee, universal, extended parental leave) In favour of a minimal universal fee; against modulation of fees Inclination towards free ECE for all children Very critical of for-profit centers
COALITION AVENIR QUÉBEC	 Against modulation of fees Free 4-year-old kindergarten for all children Not very receptive to the importance of quality ECE between 0-3 years old Mandatory screening of all 3-year-old children
Québec solidaire	 Support CPEs In favour of free, universal ECE services Not for profit and social economy
Partenaires nationaux	 Follow-up on Summit and Declaration Social advocacy leading up to the election
