## **Putting Early Learning Frameworks into Practice**

The early years environment is ground zero for children's development, but educators need support to make early childhood settings the best they can be. This Institute offers hands on introductions to well established tools for professional practice and previews new ones in development.

Experts will share their experiences about how early learning frameworks can guide your work as they shape institutional views of play as the medium to build cognitive, social and emotional competencies.

In the Atlantic Provinces and across Canada purposeful, experiential, inquiry driven learning through play is the recommended approach to supporting young children's development. Children with these experiences arrive at school with confidence and an eagerness to direct their own learning, bringing with them a respect for playful learning into primary schooling.

Early childhood educators are the ambassadors of play-based pedagogy. Your ability to articulate to parents, other educators, administrators, even your own family and friends, about what you do raises the status of the profession and the public's understanding of early education and care.

As busy people with important jobs there are few chances to step back and reflect on what we do. I hope this Institute provides that respite with great speakers, stimulating discussions, fresh ideas, gained insights and lots of time for play with new friends.

## **Keynote Speakers**



Tove Mogstad Slinde is a
Senior Adviser in the
Norwegian Ministry of
Education and Research in the
Department of Early Childhood
Education and Care. Since 2012
she is the elected Chair of the
Network on Early Childhood
Education and Care in OECD.

In the Ministry of Education and Research Tove Mogstad Slinde has been working on policy governance, research and developmental work. Ms. Slinde has worked within the ECEC sector in Norway on different levels since 1987. Among other things she has been working withmanagement and developmental work and the implementation of national policies on the regional and local levels. This has entailed cooperating closely with municipalities, kindergarten owners and other relevant institutions and stakeholders including teacher education and staff-organizations. Representing the Department of ECEC in international cooperation, she has been involved in the work of the OECD ECEC network (since 2008), as well as the Thematic Working Group on Early Childhood Education and Care in EU. She is also currently engaged in the advisory committee for the research project CARE, funded by the EU.

Tove's keynote presentation offers an overview of recent endeavours on policy development related to quality ECEC, including the recent OECD's Starting Strong V Transitions from ECEC to Primary Education and Curriculum and Quality Analysis and Impact Review European of ECEC. Tove highlights policy issues related to curriculum frameworks and quality early childhood services in Norway and in other jurisdictions.

## **Keynote Speakers**



Kathleen Flanagan is an internationally known early childhood education and care policy consultant and researcher. Kathleen has co-led several initiatives focused on human resources in the ECEC sector, and is secretariat to the Provincial-Territorial Directors of Early Childhood Education and Care. She has provided expertise in curriculum development, including the development of Nova Scotia's and PEI's early learning (curriculum) frameworks.

She recently led Manitoba's Early Learning and Child Care Commission focusing on system re-design in order to move toward universally accessible child care.

Kathleen will review the political and policy Landscape across Canada that has influenced the development of early learning curriculum frameworks across Canada, and will highlight the common elements to all frameworks currently either in place or in pilot stages. She will provide a particular focus on the Atlantic Provinces, describing common elements and common challenges. The presentation will conclude with potential next steps for the Atlantic region.
