The 'traditional' approach

- Typically 'teaching diversity' lives in one course
- Professor builds a compelling case for the importance of diversity and equity in the program
- Students are provided with a number of strategies for representing diversity in the program (recipe)
- Students are evaluated on their ability to represent diversity within the program during their field placements

Building on the traditional approach

- Professors and students engage in conversations related to "culturally relevant" pedagogy
- Each course includes discussions related to respecting and responsivity to cultural differences
- Students are encouraged to examine their own values and beliefs
- Students are supported to consider methods for creating inclusive settings and creating equity

Critical Discussions on Diversity

- A student generated and student led discussion group
- Themes that surfaced in every meeting
 - Creating space for conversation
 - Questions of representation
 - The challenge of: doing diversity or 'diversity activities' and how to move away from a focus on materials
 - Our childhood stories, our bias, our teaching
