OVERVIEW

The creation and launch of OISE's <u>Sustainability and Climate Action Plan</u> in 2021 signaled a new level of commitment for the Institute to embed this important work into its academic and operational priorities. As one of the largest and most research-intensive faculties of education in North America, and as an integral part of the University of Toronto, OISE is well-positioned to support and mobilize the education sector in this critical mission. Acknowledging that our world is now in a state of climate emergency and that there is a very limited time to shift to low-carbon and regenerative ways of living, OISE has aimed to utilize its influence in teaching, research and advocacy to address the climate crisis by embedding Sustainability and Climate Action into all facets of its work, including curriculum and teaching, research, governance, and facilities and services.

This report shares the progress that has been made on the implementation of the 24 actions and 61 strategies of OISE's Sustainability and Climate Action Plan over its three-year term. While progress has been made, so much more can, and should, be done. By drawing on the knowledge, perspectives, and expertise of OISE's students, faculty, staff, alumni, and community partners, OISE continues to improve its sustainability practices to amplify its contributions to a world that is safer, healthier and just for all.

Sustainability and climate action are integral components of OISE's work and commitment to both individual and collective wellbeing, and to a more just, equitable and sustainable world.

WORKING IN CHALLENGING TIMES

The process of developing the Sustainability & Climate Action Plan (SCAP) began in January 2020 with OISE's first Climate Action Summit. Since that time, many members of the OISE community – students, staff, faculty and alumni - have been actively engaged in minimizing OISE's carbon footprint and deepening its commitment to climate justice and action. However, the start of the COVID-19 pandemic in March 2020 closed the OISE building and shifted the focus to online delivery of its teaching, research and community commitments. This slowed down – but did not stop – the development and implementation of the actions of the SCAP. OISE established its Climate Action Advisory Committee in the spring of 2020 to guide its development, and the SCAP was launched online in January 2021, along with the announcement of the newly formed community hub now called the Sustainability & Climate Action Network (SCAN). The SCAN team began the implementation of the actions and strategies of the SCAP, achieved online for the first eighteen months, and in hybrid form (online and in-person) for the second half of its three-year term.



The new living wall was installed in March 2020, just as the OISE building (and the university as a whole) went into lockdown due to the pandemic. Its contributions to improving the aesthetics and air quality of the lobby weren't fully appreciated until the building re-opened for classes in September 2022.

NEW GROWTH

Despite the challenging conditions at its outset, OISE's SCAP has proven to be ground-breaking. It is the first plan of its type in a faculty of education in Canada, and one of the first created by a division at the University of Toronto. It supports the implementation of the priorities of the university's Committee on the Environment, Climate Change and Sustainability, and contributes to its goal of becoming a Climate Positive Campus. It recognizes and enacts the critical work that education at all levels can contribute to bring about the social, cultural and infrastructure shifts needed to address the climate crisis. And as the leading faculty of education in Canada, it models how to do this work for other faculties of education in light of the Accord on Learning for a Sustainable Future, released by the Association of Canadian Deans of Education in 2022. Thanks to the foundations of this Plan, OISE is currently recognized as a leader amongst faculties of education in Sustainability & Climate Action across the university, and across the country.




ASSESSING IMPACT

In many ways, the first three years of OISE's Sustainability & Climate Action Plan (SCAP) has been a success. As the first faculty of education in Canada to have its own plan to address the climate crisis, it has modeled both a process as well as the ways in which faculties can embed this work into their purview. It has helped meet many of the tenets of the ACDE's <u>Accord on Learning for a Sustainable Future</u>, as well as the newly released principles for Environmental Learning, Ecojustice and Climate Action now required by the Ontario College of Teachers' <u>Accreditation Resource Guide for Teacher Education Programs</u> in this province.

Looking at the metrics of the plan overall, work was begun on all 24 of its actions, fully completing 33% of these, and advancing work on the rest. We completed 51% of the 61 plan's strategies and made progress on 41% more (only five of the strategies were not able to be started). A new Climate Action Advisory Committee was established that reports directly to the Dean (one of only three such committees at OISE). A new hybrid community hub, led by the Sustainability & Climate Action Network, was established that supports and amplifies this work across the Institute with grants provided by the OISE Sustainability Fund. Over 40 SCAN events involved more than 2500 people in community engagement and outreach related to sustainability and climate action, including those organized by the new Community of Practice on Sustainability Teaching. Twenty graduate students were trained in this work in paid positions, and hundreds more engaged in environmental learning as part of their coursework. Considering its commencement during the pandemic, the metrics in this report demonstrate that the SCAP has had many positive impacts over its three years, and that the SCAP has been effective in ensuring OISE is taking steps to embed sustainability and climate action in its work in education.

SUMMARY



MOVING FORWARD

While the first three years of the OISE's Sustainability & Climate Action Plan (SCAP) have had many positive impacts, given the speed with which the climate crisis is intensifying, there is still far more work to be done, so this plan should be seen as just a beginning. As Canada's leading faculty of education, OISE is uniquely situated to have a sizable impact on the development of education's critical role in adapting to and mitigating the climate crisis. Its scholarly leadership in equity, social justice, inclusion and diverse ways of knowing offer a promising foundation on which to conduct research, design courses, and deepen work being done in Climate Justice Education. But this requires consensus across the OISE community that this should be a focal point of our work moving forward.

Implementing the SCAP has identified many questions in how to fully embed sustainability and climate action into all aspects of OISE's work. It has also raised many more questions about how best to move forward, including how to sustain this work over the long term. As OISE commences the collective development of institutional priorities for its next Academic Plan, this process provides an opportunity to discuss these questions and identify potential new areas of impact while we continue the work of sustainability and climate action already underway.
